

WRC launches its new-look Community Grants Program

Applications are now open for Wakefield Regional Council's new, streamlined Community Grants Program. Grants of up to \$25,000 will be in the mix, with this year's program and application process revised to make it simple for clubs and groups to apply.

Wakefield Mayor Rodney Reid said Council recognised the importance of this funding to the community. "In 2019, we awarded almost \$200,000 to more than 25 groups for a range of projects," Mayor Reid said. "Last year, we put the grants program on hold so we could deliver our muchneeded COVID support program but we know many groups in the community really look forward to seeking funds for their endeavours."

"The grants aim to empower the many hardworking groups and clubs we have here in Wakefield and ensure we are all working together to deliver our community's vision for Wakefield."

Full grant details are available on Council's website. To be eligible, the group or club must be based in the Wakefield region and its application must align with the three themes outlined in Wakefield 2030 – Liveable Communities, Thriving Region, Sustainable Future.

There are three separate funding categories:

- Minor Grants cover up to \$2,000
- Major Grants cover \$2,001 to \$25,000
- Minor to Major Event Sponsorships up to \$500 to \$2,000

Council will soon release details of a new Small Business grant program. People can apply using the online application available through Council's website – wrc.sa.gov.au, or by downloading or printing an editable PDF, and email to admin@wrc.sa.gov.au, or submitting in person at the Council Office on Scotland Place (open Monday-Friday 9am to 5pm).

Applications close end of May 2021 and successful grant recipients will be notified in July. For any questions or queries, please contact Community Development Officer and grant supervisor Holly Hannaford on 8862 0800.




In the Garden 2021 No 7

Goodness, how quickly the season is changing, so now is the time to do those odd jobs before winter arrives. Rake up the fallen leaves and put them in the compost bin, or leave them in a heap out of the way and cover them with a bag, shade cloth or anything that stops them blowing around. This will also help them compost, which will be great for the garden later.

A good hint given by a friend for planting in a pot: line the base of the pot with large gravel, small stones, or recycled plastic packing foam (all make good drainage), then place shade cloth over whatever you use and up the side a little. This permits water to seep out, but not your soil. You can then fill your pot with soil and plant whatever you like. Flowers aren't the only thing to plant in a pot—veggies and herbs do quite well too.

Yesterday's News

A "Ghost" at Port Wakefield.

(From the Burra Record, February 13, 1918).

During the past week the usual quiet of the northern portion of the town of Port Wakefield has been considerably disturbed by the nightly appearance of a mysterious form between Smith's corner and the railway crossing.

The first to meet the spectre was a lady returning home about 9.30 p.m. on Monday, when she was accosted with the enquiry 'How are you?' She fled, and on reaching home promptly collapsed. Half an hour later a young man, returning to his lodgings after an hour spent on the water, noticed the side of a small haystack open and disgorge seven feet or more of a 'ghost' who gave a series of moans, but before the last moan died away the youth was safely inside his habitation, the 130 yards being covered by him under record time.

On Tuesday evening a young couple, in a haven of bliss, were slowly wending their way homeward, when a cold hand placed on their heads caused them to look straight into the awful eyes of a shadowy substance several feet in height and clothed in mist: The young fellow cleared six feet of paling fence seeking safety in flight. The girl, after a round of screams, sought refuge in the first available house.

On Wednesday night two young men, assisted by a nearly full moon and armed in divers ways, laid in wait, and after two hours watching observed an object rise apparently from the earth; and after 'mesmerising' a horse to such an extent that the affrighted beast laid down in an unconscious condition, the 'apparition,' after passing over walls and fences, disappeared in an old quarry, where it was thought best to leave it.

On Thursday night two men passing this spot were having a heated argument over Russia, when they suddenly found that a third party had joined them wearing clothing resembling grey smoke, and the wearer seemed to be much above the usual height, but before any further particulars were noted both men were in safe keeping. Taking advantage of the heat on Friday night, a man was sleeping in his front verandah immediately under the bedroom window. About midnight from some accountable reason he woke up to see some hideous object making mysterious signs to him over the picket fence. He promptly entered the bedroom, taking the window-sash with him.

Various descriptions of this mysterious visitor have been given. They all agree, however, to the height being about eight feet, with fearful eyes and several other items which are required to make up a respectable 'ghost.' The mystery was somewhat cleared up the other night by a boy, who ran into an old, grey horse feeding alongside the road. The lad states that the animal, when struck with the bike, rose up in the air, and tried to hit things with its fore-feet.

children, parents, and grandparents were kept fully engaged.




