Yesterday's News

The Areas' Express July 21st 1883.



PORT WAKEFIELD- I would advise tradespeople and others to be on their guard against receiving counterfeit coins as they are frequently being passed. One (a spurious half-crown) having been passed last week at one of the local hotels. The coin is a very good imitation of a genuine one, but lacks the brightness and smoothness and weight of the genuine coin, and when tried does not ring and is easily cut with a knife. It is in Mounted Constable Dowling's possession, who has shown it all over the place, and requested people to assist him in detecting any person trying to pass similar counterfeits.

The much talked of Wills Creek or "Price " as the new township is called is beginning to go ahead and last week W. Moore & Co opened a branch store there, on the occasion of which several farmers and others were invited to the opening. After a hearty lunch, to which a great number sat down, " success to Price " was drank, and after the usual toasts and speeches the large store was cleared and about sixteen couples tripped the light fantastic until an early hour the following morning.

Perhaps not the most enjoyable or enviable part of the fun happened to the party who left here about 5.30 a.m. in an open boat expecting to get there about 9 a.m. But when they got across the Gulf no one knew the exact entrance to the creek. They eventually determined to try their luck with the result that they got "stuck in the mud." 




