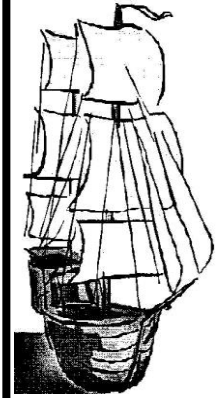

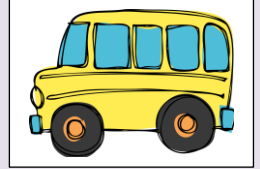

LET'S GLOW!

How To Make Homemade Body Wash



In the quest for natural living, we sometimes forget the essentials. We're always reading the labels on our food, but what about our shower products? There are so many hard-to-read (i.e., chemical) ingredients on that body wash bottle that it's almost insane. Here's everything you need to know about making your own homemade body wash.

As with any homemade bath and body product, you'll want to customize it to meet your personal needs. This list is just a starting point, so feel free to use any ingredients you've got in the pantry or fridge. If you can use it in a face mask, chances are you can use it in body wash!

Moisturisers: Almond, Olive, Coconut or Sesame carrier oils. Skin Soothers: Aloe Vera, Essential oils, Shea Butter, Raw Honey, Green or Chamomile Tea, Powdered Goat's Milk or Colloidal Oats. Antioxidants: Vitamin E oil, Turmeric Powder, Matcha Powder, Vitamin C Powder. Fragrance: Essential Oils

This simple recipe is a great place to start when making your own body wash. Try adding any of the ingredients listed above to customize the recipe. I recommend starting with 1–2 teaspoons of add-in ingredients and working up from there.

—1/3 cup liquid Castile soap —1/3 cup filtered water —1 tablespoon carrier oil of your choice —2 tablespoons vegetable glycerin

Combine the ingredients in a 250ml pump or squeeze bottle. Gently swirl the bottle to combine them, trying not to create bubbles. Use within 1–2 months. Keep On Glowing!

Yesterday's News

The Woorora Producer August 5th, 1915



PORT WAKEFIELD-- Australia Day was celebrated at Port Wakefield on Friday last, and was responsible for the largest and most enthusiastic gathering ever witnessed there. The day was all that could be desired. Willing workers transferred the oval into patriotic semblance, the entrance being beautifully arched and covered with the Allies' flags. The town was also showing its best, and every flagpole was flying the national emblems. Business places were closed shortly before 11 a.m and the railway employees were granted half a day on full pay. And by noon, the appointed time for the march, both town and country had gathered in a massed force near the oval. With commendable punctuality the band struck up the National Anthem at noon, and the procession paraded the principal streets, headed by the mounted police, followed by Britannia, the defence rifle club, band, corporation and district council officials, Italians (carrying the Allies flags), friendly societies, massed schools, Scottish corps (with bagpipes), fire brigade, footballers, life boat and crew, Australian band, public, motor cars, aboriginals, and all imaginable costume. At the conclusion of the march the crowd assembled in front of the pavilion, where addresses were delivered by the Mayor (Mr. J. J. Thomas), Mr. R. Nicbolls, and the Rev. J. C. Richmond. Dinner and afternoon tea were provided by the ladies, and abundance of provisions were available in St. Alban's Hall during the day. In the afternoon sports and various kinds of amusements were provided for all ages.

A splendid Australian flag, presented by Mr. J. W. Humphrey, for competition amongst the various schools, was secured by the Port Wakefield schools. Various amusing costumes were in evidence, and the amount collected by them greatly assisted the day's takings. Rifle gallery, Aunt Sallies, and other attractions brought in good returns, while the "Hostralia Band" got up to perfection, swelled the returns. The fire brigade gave a most amusing performance in coping with a small fire. The fortune-teller pleased all her visitors to such an extent that many were loath to believe the good fortune awaiting them in the near future. Mr. Shroder superintended the art gallery and museum, which was really a well-thought-out affair, and reflected great credit on some of the local brain power. A concert in the evening went far beyond the record. The total day's proceeds and concert were over £150, and with that collected by the Mayoross (Mrs. J. J. 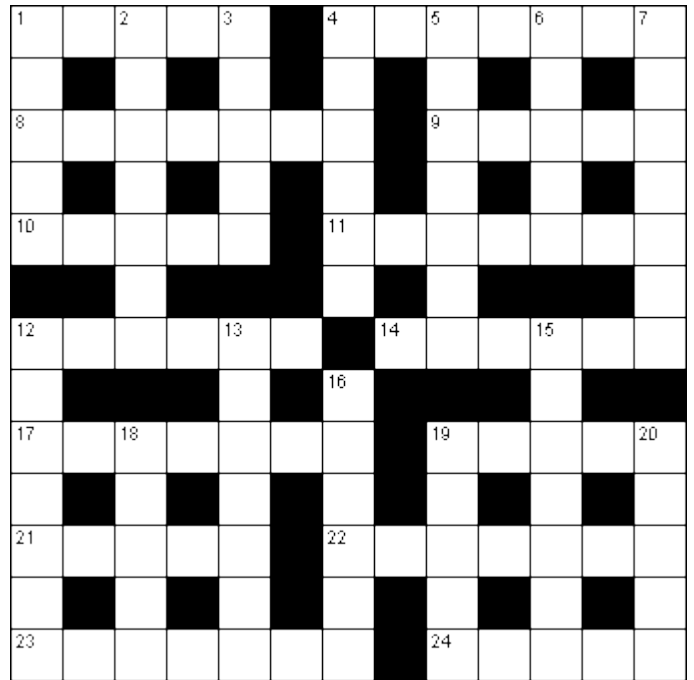
