

Wendy Claire Garvie

March 10, 1937 – August 14, 2022



Wendy became involved in the Port Wakefield community when she first came to Port Wakefield in the 1980's. She was very community minded and quite an artist – always with a positive attitude.

A brief summary of Wendy's achievements is listed, in no particular order.

One of the initial instigators of establishing the Courthouse Museum.

She fought to have the Proof Range gun retained at the highway entrance to the P&EE.

She instigated the retention and signage of the pepper tree at the Soldiers Memorial Hall car park.

Wendy also worked with the Port Wakefield Primary School students, completing the Jack Brabham sign board, and arranged through the PW CMC to establish Brabham Park, opposite the Rising Sun Hotel (not completed). Also, with the Port Wakefield Primary students, she created and painted murals.

Wendy (with Elizabeth) gained licence from SA Power Networks to paint stobie poles in Port Wakefield. She also worked with others to establish a park next to the Catholic Church with a tiled wall (the Port Wakefield Commemorative Community Wall 2002) with families in the community contributing with their own tiles.

The book "Welcome to Port Wakefield, An Historic Town in a Modern World. Landmarks, Parks, Places of Interest, Business and Anecdotes & the Pioneers Our Street Names Celebrate" she wrote as an investigated history of Port Wakefield. This can still be purchased at the Newsletter Office in the Institute Building on Burra Street, and at Balaklava Library.

Amongst countless other things, Wendy was also a member of the Port Wakefield Community Management Committee (1980's), the Port Wakefield Community Newsletter until her passing, and the recipient of the Port Wakefield Citizen of the Year 2004.

Her most recent pursuit was negotiating pedestrian access to the new Liberty Roadhouse when the original plan for an access road was rejected.

As current and post volunteers at the PW Newsletter we will greatly miss her laughter, assistance, presence, and joy she brought us all. To all of her family, we offer our sincerest condolences.

Her service will be held at Balaklava Funeral Chapel, 16 Scotland Street, Balaklava, on Monday, August 29th at 1.00pm

LET'S GLOW!

How To Clean A Cutting Board – Why Rinsing Is Not Enough...

As anyone who has ever come down with a bad case of food poisoning will tell you, there's something to be said for colour coding your chopping boards and really deep cleaning your kitchen. I think we have all heard that designating one colour of cutting board for raw meat and another for fresh produce will help keep you from cross-contaminating your food, and disinfecting your cutlery, counter tops and kitchen sink will help keep food-borne illnesses at bay.

But despite knowing how important this is, I still can't bring myself to do it all the time. I'm more of a chop, rinse and hope for the best kind of chef (eww, I know). But I have now come to realize the importance of really sanitising my kitchen quickly and naturally.

Modern cleaning methods aren't perfect, and even after sanitising your kitchen there are still germs left behind, especially on surfaces made of plastic, wood, and even stainless steel. So, no, just wiping down your cutting board isn't enough!


1. Clean and Disinfect

Rinse your board to get rid of any leftover food residue and use a cloth soaked with a little bit of vinegar to remove any stuck-on food particles. Pour or spray 3% hydrogen peroxide all over your cutting board and distribute it as best you can with a clean rag. Let it sit for a few minutes to kill the germs, then rinse.

2. Deodorize and Remove Stains

Sprinkle the board with salt and let it sit for several hours to absorb any lingering smells. To remove stains and get rid of any residual odours, scrub the board with a mixture of salt and lemon juice. The acid in the lemon juice will give the abrasive salt the extra kick it needs to remove tough stains.

Sadly, yesterday wasn't the way the A grade was hoping to finish the season, with an 89-point loss crushing any glimmer of hope of making the top four and finals.


